MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR AND EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

The Jewish Community Foundation is a community asset that becomes even more valuable during uncertain times. Throughout the 2020-2021 fiscal year, we've seen how the Foundation's various initiatives work together to make a significant impact in times of crisis. Our Unrestricted Grant Program provided vital funding for emerging needs in our community. Our flexible approach enabled fund holders to maximize their impact and direct funds where they were needed most. Institutional funds provided a stable source of revenue for charitable organizations during an economic downturn. In addition, our close relationship to Jewish Federation positioned us to identify and address the rapidly shifting needs of our community. This report outlines just a few of the initiatives we've taken to support our community through the pandemic.

The ways we work with our fund holders are at the forefront of how the Foundation makes a positive, meaningful impact on our community, and the value of this partnership was more apparent than ever this past year. We are proud to work closely with fund holders to understand their interests, realize their philanthropic visions, and maximize the charitable impact of their distributions.

At the onset of the pandemic, fund holders turned to us for guidance to better understand the pressing needs in our community in order to make a meaningful impact. Their determination to respond to this crisis, and the confidence they showed in the Foundation, spoke volumes. As every area of our community faced similar challenges in the wake of the pandemic, our increasingly integrated and strategic response translated into maximized support for the entire community.

Through our participation on Jewish Federation's Community Recovery Task Force—an integral part of Jewish Federation's strategic response to the pandemic—we've seen the needs of our community change rapidly and in unprecedented ways since COVID-19 began. Our direct involvement with the task force provided us with a detailed and comprehensive view of the emerging needs in our community.

This year, in response to these needs and with the commitment and confidence of our fund holders, we distributed \$3.3 million to support a broad range of organizations, programs, and services in our community.

The Foundation distributed over \$270,000 through our Unrestricted Grant Program, which is more funding than we have distributed in any previous year. This is due in large part to the trust and confidence our fund holders have in the Foundation to direct funds where they are needed most.

Knowing how severely COVID-19 was impacting our community, several fund holders converted their donor advised funds into unrestricted funds, and others chose to support the grant program with the distributable income from their funds-trusting the Foundation to disburse the income to meet the most pressing needs.

Throughout the year, fund holders built their funds and community members established new funds to make a difference. The Foundation secured \$2.9 million in contributions, bringing the overall assets under management to \$73 million. These funds will continue to make an impact in our community for generations to come.

Markets rebounded sharply through the year. As a result, for the fiscal year ending March 31, 2021, the Foundation's rate of return on its investments was 24% gross of fees versus the policy benchmark of 22.1%. The Foundation's rate of return net of all fees was 22.4%, in a year when inflation rose by 2.2%. Over the longer term, in the 10 years ending March 31, 2021, the annualized average investment return net of all fees is a healthy 6.3%, relative to inflation at 1.6% over the period, representing a return of 4.7% above inflation.

Over the course of the past year, the governors, committee chairs and standing committees have worked hard to ensure that our programs were responsive to changing community needs, and that we strengthened our policies and processes. We are deeply appreciative of their service and their dedication to our community.

In a year that was exceptionally challenging, we are proud of the ways our fund holders, governors and staff have come together. It is through our shared commitment to community that we are able to make such a significant impact, and we are grateful for your trust and confidence. As we enter the recovery stage of the pandemic, we look forward to our continued collaboration to ensure a thriving future for our community.

PORTFOLIO PERFORMANCE

The Foundation's prudent investment strategy has continued to perform well over the long term. This year's returns succeeded in surpassing our policy benchmark, despite much financial uncertainty around the world.


For the fiscal year ending March 31, 2021, the Jewish Community Foundation's rate of return on its investments was 24% gross of fees versus the policy benchmark of 22.1%. The Foundation's rate of return net of all fees was 22.4%, in a year when inflation rose by 2.2%.

The Foundation's assets are invested with the objective of earning a total return that is, on average, equal to the annual rate of increase in the Consumer Price Index plus 3.5% (referred to as the investment objective).

The Foundation's portfolio has provided a solid return over the past 10 years. In the 10 years ending March 31, 2021, the annualized average investment return net of all fees is a healthy 6.3%, relative to inflation at 1.6% over the period, representing a return of 4.7% above inflation.

GROWTH OF \$10,000 FROM MARCH 31, 2011 TO MARCH 31, 2021






MAXIMIZING OUR COMMUNITY IMPACT

The Jewish Community Foundation distributed \$3.3 million in grants to support our community; a 22% increase over last year.

This increase in distributions is a testament to the extent to which our fund holders turned to their endowment funds to make an impact during a time when the needs of our community were rapidly increasing and changing in unprecedented ways. Distributions made through these funds were crucial in helping our community meet these unforeseen challenges and continue to deliver vital programs and services during a time when community members needed them the most.

The Foundation responded strategically to our community's widespread needs through distributions from endowment funds. Whether it was unrestricted funds, which offer the most flexibility to respond to community needs; designated funds, which provide support to specific organizations, causes and areas of interest; or donor advised funds, with distributions decided annually by the donor, funds managed by the Foundation provided a stable source of funding during an uncertain time.



WORKING WITH OUR FUND HOLDERS

As the centre for philanthropy and legacy giving in the Jewish community, the Foundation works directly with fund holders to achieve their philanthropic goals.

We work closely with fund holders to understand their passions and interests. Then we connect them with community needs, where they can make an impact.

The Foundation is well positioned to identify current and emerging needs in our community, and acts as a trusted advisor to fund holders. This was particularly important over the past year, as fund holders turned to the Foundation for guidance to meet COVID-19 related priorities. The depth of our community knowledge, combined with the trust and confidence of our fund holders, put the Foundation at the forefront of our community's recovery.

INSTITUTIONAL ENDOWMENTS

Institutional endowment funds enable charitable organizations to create a source of stable, long-term funding to support their important work in perpetuity.

For many children, summer camp is their main connection to Jewish life. Camp Miriam has a long-standing policy that no child be turned away due to lack of funds and provides approximately \$200,000 in camperships each summer to assist families who are otherwise unable to afford camp. In 2018. Camp Miriam established the John Fraser Fund for Camp Miriam to inspire alumni and community members to make legacy commitments that will provide funding for camperships in perpetuity. The fund was named to honour John Fraser, a former member of parliament and committed supporter of Camp Miriam and its ideals.

George Mate, an alumnus volunteer, spearheaded the effort to build the camp's endowment fund. George was inspired by a friend who was passionate about the campership program and made a legacy commitment, despite not having children who attended camp.

"Our partnership with the Foundation ensures that we are establishing an endowment that alumni can contribute to with confidence, knowing the fund is being managed and invested in perpetuity," expressed George. "Our goal is to create an ongoing source of funding to enable us to continue to provide invaluable summer camp experiences for campers of all means, well into the future."

To date, 30 alumni and community members have made legacy commitments in support of Camp Miriam camperships.

"I strongly believe in the importance of a Jewish camp experience and want to ensure all kids have access to Camp Miriam's programs. I have seen firsthand how meaningful this experience is for young people and how it connects them to Jewish life for many, many years after attending camp."

IMPACTFUL GRANTMAKING


The 2021 Unrestricted Grant
Program was perfectly positioned
to support our community's
response to COVID-19.

The Unrestricted Grant Program is designed to support emerging needs throughout our community. In order to be as responsive as possible to the challenges presented by the pandemic, we expanded this year's program eligibility to include retroactive funding for unexpected COVID-related expenses.

The pandemic challenged organizations to change the way they delivered services and engaged community members in unprecedented ways. Every facet of community was affected, from synagogues and schools to arts and cultural programs. Organizations had to adapt rapidly while trying to meet increased needs.

This year's grant applications reflected the need for funding in four critical areas (right).

We are proud to have distributed over \$270,000 through this year's program — more funding than we have distributed in any previous year — for 16 important projects that will enable community organizations to adapt to new ways of delivering their programs and services while keeping the people who rely on them safe.



2020/21 GRANT RECIPIENTS: COVID PREPAREDNESS

COVID-19 Preparedness for Camp Programs Camp Hatikvah

After having to cancel their 2020 season due to COVID-19, Camp Hatikvah is doing everything it can to welcome nearly 800 campers and counselors back to camp this summer. In order to be able to operate, the camp is incurring expenses related to COVID safety and preparedness measures, such as rapid testing, sanitization, enhanced outdoor spaces, and increased outdoor programming. For many children, summer camp is their main connection to Jewish life. After all they've been through in the last year, a safe camp experience will provide them with a much needed return to their friends and community.

COVID-19 Preparedness for School Programs King David High School

Ensuring a safe and positive learning environment for students this past school year was no easy feat. King David High School invested in many additional resources to be able to continue operating safely and effectively. COVID-19 preparedness costs included the installation of plexiglass dividers and outdoor tenting, additional custodial staff and cleaning supplies, and technology upgrades to provide online learning and more.


Housing Expenses Unsecured Loan Program Hebrew Free Loan Association

The objective of this loan program is to alleviate the financial stress associated with housing relocation by providing small, interest-free loans to low-income individuals and families. Under this program, the Hebrew Free Loan Association offers loans for one-time housing expenses such as security deposits, moving expenses, and emergency rent coverage. While these may seem like relatively small expenses, they often present a significant barrier to securing safe, stable housing. This pilot program makes loans accessible without a co-signer, providing financial support for more people in our community during an especially difficult time.

Rent Affordability for Ben & Esther Dayson Residences **Tikva Housing Society**

Housing affordability is a major issue in Metro Vancouver, and the situation has been made worse by COVID-19. Tikva Housing Society is addressing this issue by providing affordable housing and temporary rent subsidies, primarily for working-age, low income Jewish adults and families, especially those whose income has been reduced or lost due to COVID-19. The grants are distributed according to the specific needs of each family based on their reported income for 2020.





2020/21 GRANT RECIPIENTS: MENTAL HEALTH

Sustaining Recovery Program Jewish Addiction Community Services (JACS)

JACS provides culturally appropriate, integrated services to address addiction and addiction-related issues in our community. Recovery from addiction is an active process of continual growth, and finding a community to support the individual on this journey is crucial for long term success. The Sustaining Recovery Program aims to build integrated support systems that clients can access for the long term, including post-recovery.

Now more than ever, safe outdoor educational spaces are vital for the wellbeing of teachers and students alike. Vancouver Talmud Torah's community garden will offer just that, with the added opportunity for students to learn about sustainability in a Jewish context. The garden will create a landscape where Jewish values related to growing food and connecting to nature can be experienced in an authentic and exciting way.

Seniors Program Manager Temple Sholom Synagogue

The pandemic heightened many of the socialemotional issues facing seniors in our community. For many seniors, a regular schedule of programming is vital to their wellbeing, especially during this time of increased social isolation. As a synagogue with one of the largest seniors' cohorts in Vancouver, Temple Sholom's part-time seniors program manager will coordinate COVID-safe programming and provide oneon-one attention for their senior membership.



Shalhevet Girls High School, Vancouver Hebrew Academy, and Vancouver Talmud Torah

The stress of the pandemic took a toll on many teachers' mental health. Rapidly adjusting their classrooms and teaching methods to follow changing public health orders, increased concerns about their students' wellbeing, and anxieties about their own safety and that of their families, were just a few of the factors affecting teachers this past year. This grant supports wellness initiatives developed specifically for Jewish day school teachers and staff.

Social and Emotional Learning Counselor Vancouver Hebrew Academy

Vancouver Hebrew Academy will engage a social and emotional learning counselor in order to mitigate the impact of COVID-19 on their students' education and mental health. The counselor will provide one-onone support for students as they navigate the social dynamics of school, friendships, big emotions, and

the pandemic. They will also facilitate the integration of social and emotional learning into both Jewish and general studies curricula, thus contributing to the school's positive learning environment.

Weekend Supervision and Housekeeping Yaffa Housing Society

The effects of the pandemic have not been spread evenly across our community, with the impact being felt hardest by those who were already vulnerable. The Yaffa Housing Society, which provides group living and support for Jewish adults struggling with mental illness, recognized the need for added support for their residents. Hiring additional support staff will help residents mitigate isolation and loneliness by coordinating social activities that encourage them to interact with each other, as well as providing necessary housekeeping services at the residences.

2020/21 GRANT RECIPIENTS: TECHNOLOGY INFRASTRUCTURE

In-Person and Virtual Programming Support Jewish Community Centre

The JCC offers programming for people of every life stage and ability. When the pandemic hit, the JCC had to adjust to new ways of delivering these programs. Grant funding supported technology upgrades for virtual programming as well as setting up the protocols needed for in-person programming, such as enhanced ventilation and cleaning, and increased staffing. While programming may be virtual or at reduced in-person capacity for the foreseeable future, the JCC will continue to keep our community connected through programs that foster companionship, belonging and good health.

Service Delivery IT Infrastructure Jewish Family Services

The need for social services in our community increased drastically in the last year, and JFS had to pivot quickly to deliver these services remotely. In order to operate efficiently in this new environment, several of their technological systems required upgrades. Specific areas included a live chat function for communicating with counseling clients and GPS capabilities for their food delivery program. These upgrades have enabled JFS to serve more people in our community, connecting clients to the resources they need in both the immediate- and long-term future.

LiveAssist Automated Security System Louis Brier Home and Hospital

COVID-19 had a devastating impact on the most vulnerable in our community, and long-term care facilities were hit particularly hard. Louis Brier Home and Hospital has shown exemplary commitment to health and safety throughout the pandemic. LiveAssist is an automated monitoring system that provides added safety and security for residents and their families, as well as frontline staff. The innovative system monitors the flow of all individuals entering, exiting and moving within the facility, providing increased infection prevention and control.

Digital Film Platforms and New Technologies Vancouver Jewish Film Centre

Jewish arts and cultural programs provide valuable inroads to Jewish community life. Since the Vancouver Jewish Film Centre could no longer offer in-person screenings due to COVID-19, they implemented new digital platforms to deliver their film presentations — including the 32nd annual Vancouver Jewish Film Festival — online. Online film screening is projected to continue beyond 2022, even as in-person film screenings return, offering the potential for the festival to widen its reach to new audiences.

Live Streaming Capacity at the Rothstein Theatre Vancouver West Side Theatre

Amid a global pandemic, Jewish arts and culture initiatives are a part of what keeps our community connected. This year, the Vancouver West Side Theatre, which operates the Rothstein Theatre and the Chutzpah! Festival, is repurposing the Rothstein Theatre as a live streaming studio in order to deliver their performances remotely. By supporting necessary upgrades to live streaming technology and providing staff with training, our grant will ensure that audiences will have access to the theatre's exciting performances.

Educating Without Barriers in a Digital Age Richmond Jewish Day School

In the age of digital learning amid the COVID-19 crisis, Richmond Jewish Day School improved their technological systems to enhance student learning outcomes. Through enhanced technology for classrooms, additional teacher training, and new digital programs, the school was able to more equitably meet the needs of diverse learners and students of varying socio-economic backgrounds, ensuring that every child can succeed in this new learning environment.



AN UNPRECEDENTED RESPONSE

We are proud to have distributed more funding through this year's Unrestricted Grant Program than we have in any previous year.

In addition to the income available from the unrestricted funds for the grant program this year, several fund holders decided to contribute to this year's program in a few different ways. Some, seeing how severely COVID-19 was impacting our community, decided to convert their donor advised funds into unrestricted funds.

"I wanted my philanthropic dollars to go toward the areas of the community I care about most," expressed one fund holder, who prefers to remain anonymous. "This year, the need in our community is so great and increasing so rapidly, what I care most about is our community's recovery as a whole. I trust the Foundation's expertise to make distributions from my fund in the most effective and impactful way possible, and they made it easy for me to switch the structure of my fund in order to do so."

Other donor advised fund holders elected to direct the distributable income from their funds toward the Unrestricted Grant Program this year for similar reasons. Collectively, these actions taken by our fund holders will enable our community to continue to thrive beyond this difficult time.


